Dear Land Surveyors,

Since the publication of the previous issue of *Geodetski vestnik*, we have experienced a campaign and a general election to the Parliament of the Republic of Slovenia, which means that in a strictly geodetical sense – albeit only symbolically – we have mapped the beginning and the end of a boundary. This is the main reason that the editorial you are reading pushes aside the challenges of our profession, but I had little choice.

One may come across a similar situation in geodesy – for example, during measurements to determine the boundaries of individual plots of land. One starts feeling more at home, no?

Dear colleagues, do not think about what others should do to spur you into action, better consider what you yourself should do to make others do what should be done. The thought has been difficult to shape; it is not simple to read, let alone act upon it. There is no need for a revolution; it only takes to combine the wisdom of senior colleagues and the agility of junior ones, so that everybody would cross the finish line at the same time.
